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ESS starts Kilimanjaro: Tanzania

The Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Centre is located in the foothills of the snow capped, Mount Kilimanjaro in Moshi Tanzania. KCMC is the second largest medical school in Tanzania and is also involved in postgraduate medical education of physicians in various medical specialties . The Essential Surgical Skills course has been initiated at Kilimanjaro. This makes it the second center for ESS in Tanzania as the program is already running in Dar es Salaam. At the KCMC an ESS course was conducted by Dr. Ronald Lett with the support of Dr. Robin Fairfull- Smith, a Surgical Educator of University of Ottawa , and followed by provider's course with 24 interns participating. CNIS provided all the teaching equipment and learning aids necessary to run the course. As Dr. Fairfull- Smith states "CNIS had developed such cheap, but meaningful simulation models of practicing surgical techniques. I was extremely impressed with the Essential Surgical Skills course". At the end of the course, Dr. Kondo was named the ESS patron and Dr. Swai the ESS director. The course was well received and it is expected that Dr. Fairfull- Smith will return in June to work with Dr. Kondo and Dr. Swai to implement another provider's course. The five day intensive workshop continues to benefit primary care practitioners throughout Africa. The ESS program in Tanzania is supported by CIDA and the Donner Canadian Foundation.



Facility upgrade for the CNIS

The CNIS will move its office to #105-1985 West Broadway on April 1st. The new location will be further west on Broadway in the Kitsilano neighbourhood and is half way between Vancouver Hospital and the University of British Columbia. The move will not only be an upgrade in appearance and local visibility for the CNIS, but more importantly will increase opportunities to engage the Canadian public in various events. In addition to administrative space, there will be a classroom which CNIS intends



to convert to a surgical learning centre. The other public area will be a development resource center. Over the past 11 years the CNIS has gained a lot of experience in surgical education, and has published instructors and learners manuals on a variety of subjects. CNIS utilized this knowledge by providing workshops on development issues. Having in-house accommodations for these activities will increase our productivity. Funding is being sought for accomplishment of these public engagement objectives.

ACC-ESS meeting; showing fast forward progress


The African Canadian Committee for Essential Surgical Skills held its 5th annual meeting in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania from November 30th to December 3rd. The meeting was co-chaired by Dr. Naboth Mbembati, and Dr. Ronald Lett. Surgeons from Ethiopia, Uganda, Malawi and Tanzania attended. Canadian surgeons from the CNIS, and the Office of International Surgery, University of Toronto were also present. The ESS program which is conducted in these countries was reviewed, and plans were made to continue updating the students' manual. Discussions also evolved around the Innovation project which is the establishment of dedicated surgical learning centers at 6 Universities in Ethiopia. The Ethiopian surgeons had a satellite meeting to draw plans for the first of these centers. Following the structured meeting, the surgeons performed the 40 skills of ESS as the stars of a DVD recording. The main purpose behind the DVD is to produce a standard presentation for all centers on how each surgical skill is performed. The next step, editing of these recordings is underway. After the ACC-ESS meeting the participants from the 5 countries had the opportunity to attend the annual meeting of the College of Surgeons of East Central and Southern Africa also held in Dar es Salaam. Dr. Mulat Taye will co-chair ACC-ESS 2006.



ENAHPA WORKING TOWARDS \$100,000 FOR INNOVATION PROJECT

The Innovation project involves the establishment of surgical learning centers in six universities in Ethiopia. These centers will be dedicated towards the teaching of surgical and obstetrical care. The CNIS initiated this project to increase the Ethiopian capacity to train and certify physicians. The Ethiopian North American Health Professionals Association (ENAHPA) has agreed to raise \$100,000 for the CNIS Innovation project. So far ENAHPA has contributed \$14,500. The first of the dedicated learning centers is now under way in Addis Abba and the first of the satellite learning centers will be initiated in Awassa at Debu University in March. Dr. Ronald Lett and Dr. Tarek Razek (board member from Montreal) will conduct a workshop on International Surgery in conjunction with the ENAHPA Annual General Meeting, in Washington DC. Both ENAHPA members and others interested in international surgery are encouraged to attend. The partnership of CNIS with the Ethiopian diaspora represented by ENAHPA is also innovative.

Medical books valued at about \$300, 000 arrived in Ethiopia in late December and were stored at the Black Lion hospital, Addis Ababa in the interval. In mid January, Dr. Peter McLean and his wife Ariane undertook the task of unpacking, sorting, distributing equitably, and repacking 400 boxes of books for transport to the six medical schools. Dr. Zufan Lakew, Dean of Medicine (AAU) provided the Dean Conference room for the process. Her efforts are highly appreciated. Five outlying universities collected the books over the period of three weeks. A visit was made to Awassa Debub University Hospital on February 2nd, where Dean Zelalem kindly showed Dr. McLean and his wife


around. The boxes of books had arrived and were in a storage space. The present medical school library at Awassa is in temporary quarters with a small stacking facility. Adjacent to the Hospital is a new library that is under construction and has not yet been occupied. In March, a number of visits to the other outlying universities will be undertaken.

AFRICAN AWARENESS IN VANCOUVER AT UBC

During the month of January Dr. Ronald Lett who is an adjunct professor at the University of British Columbia presented to the Surgical Advisory Committee, recommending the establishment of an MSc in International Surgery. Dr. Lett also gave a guest lecture to graduate students in the department of community health and epidemiology about the works of the CNIS. On a separate event, Dr. Lett held a forum to initiate a Student Research Consortium on Injury in Africa with Matt Smith, a UBC student volunteer. Dr. Lett presented a photo exhibit entitled Safari Za Arika. The last two events were part of the UBC African Awareness week organized by Ruth Situma and Jo-Ann Osei-Twum. Dr. Lett also gave a presentation on the Child Traffic Injury Prevention project funded by Rotary to the Arbutus Rotary Club in Vancouver.

What is going on in Africa ?

Gwen Hollaar, CNIS past chair and Berhanu Kottisso, ESS senior instructor conducted the first Structured Hernia Repair Workshop in Addis Ababa from January 23 - 28. The purpose of the workshop is to make junior doctors competent to perform this important procedure. Dr. Hollaar has volunteered many times for the CNIS in Uganda, but this was her first trip to Ethiopia. This workshop was supported with funding from CIDA and the Wild Rose Foundation of Alberta.



CIDA has appointed **Darren Rogers** as the Project Advisor to the CNIS. CNIS reports quarterly to CIDA, and Mr. Rogers wrote to CNIS on January 26th: "CIDA has reviewed and accepted the CNIS's progress report covering the period October 1st to December 31st 2005.....This report being my initiation to your project, I was surprised at its breadth of activities and I am pleased to read that all components appear to be progressing as expected."
