The 8th Bethune Round Table conference on international surgery hosted in Vancouver on May 9- 10, 2008 had record breaking participation. This Canadian initiative devoted to addressing surgical issues facing low-income regions around the world. 

This meeting in Vancouver was hosted by both the Branch for International Surgery (BIS) of the University of British Columbia (UBC) and the CNIS. Dr Robert Taylor, both a Clinical Associate Professor at UBC and a Surgeon Associate of the CNIS, was the principle

organizer and the Conference Chair. The theme of the conference was, "Addressing Outcomes and Impact of International Surgery Initiatives".

CNIS was heavily involved in the roundtable as five CNIS-partner African surgeons (see photo) attended. Three received scholarship, and had podium while two had posters presentations. Two of the keynote speakers, Dr. Gwen Hollaar and Dr. Jan Christilaw, are active members of the CNIS.

A conference highlight was Dr Haile Debas', Director of Global Health Sciences at the University of California, presentation on the "Evolution of Surgery in International Health" in which he stressed the evolving recognition of the public health significance of the burden of surgical disease. He noted a strong need for increased training in emergency and essential surgical care as good data to show that essential surgical care is cost-effective. We note that these are principles of CNIS. The CNIS was truly pleased to co-host this year's BRT.

## A Special Tribute to Our Volunteers

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## The Failure of Humanity: A discussion with Roméo Dallaire


More than 620 people attended a presentation by Lt-General (Rtd) Roméo Dallaire on Friday, June 13th 2008 in Vancouver. The event was hosted by the CNIS with the financial support of the Child and Family Research Institute and Office of Pediatric Surgery Evaluation and Innovation OPSEI. The moving orator discussed the nature of peacekeeping and conflict resolution efforts in the and prevent it from responding to current problems facing humanity such as Darfur. ## Pre BRT Skills Courses Instructors Workshop.

The CNIS hosted four workshops at our Vancouver office the week prior to the BRT. The instructors workshops for the Structured Hernia Repair, Essential Surgical Skills, Structured Operative Obstetrics, and Trauma Team training were taught by Drs: Gwen Hollaar, Robert Taylor, Jan Christilaw, Tarek Razek and Ronald Lett. All the courses were accredited by the Royal College of Surgeons for continuing medical education credit.

The thirty-seven participants from across Canada and Dr. Mbembati from Tanzania. The purpose of the instructors

workshops is to have sufficient Canadian instructors to support the CNIS courses in Africa. Another Structured Operative Obstetrics Instructors course is scheduled for October 28th in Ottawa.
